

### **Doing Your Bit at Work**

#### **Cut Down Waste and Buy Recycled**

The best way you can make an impact at work is to make sure you understand and use any office or site recycling schemes. If there are none, find out who is responsible for waste at your office or site and ask why.

Try to consider ways you can reduce your own personal waste and re-use things before you think about recycling. Paper use is a good example of an area where you can reduce and reuse:

- If your printer or photocopier has the function available, set it up to print on both sides of the paper.
- Ask if it is possible to set up a paper tray on your printer and photocopier for drafts using the blank side of misprints that would normally be thrown away.
- Try to email documents rather than printing them off.
- Only print off pages that are necessary from documents and reports.
- Put up memos in central communal areas rather than distributing copies to all staff.
- Save documents on disk or email them rather than printing off copies to take home.

Ask if your organisation subscribes to the Mayor's Green Procurement Code, which promotes recycled office stationary products and IT consumables. Suggest your organisation donates any unwanted office equipment and furniture rather than throwing it away. Green-works will collect such items and pass them onto local community groups and charities. If your company is involved in manufacturing, find out whether it could advertise any left over waste materials in a waste exchange. Waste exchanges allow companies to match their waste, defective or surplus materials with the resource needs of other companies. # Save Energy

Switch off computers and any non-essential electrical equipment at night or before going home and over weekends. Make sure you know your company's policy before switching off any shared equipment.

# Go for 'Green' Commuting

Find out if your employer has a Green Transport Plan that encourages staff to use their cars less to travel into work. Such plans might include:

- The provision of extra facilities for staff who cycle to work such as dry and safe storage for their bikes and shower and changing rooms.
- An interest free loan for staff to purchase a bicycle or season tickets on public transport.
- Flexi-time working arrangements and allowing staff to work from home where possible.
- A staff car-pooling scheme.
- A public transport policy for company business trips.
- Increased salary alternative to a company car.

An EMS helps to identify opportunities to reduce material consumption and waste and continually improve environmental performance. Find out what you can do to help meet your organisation's environmental targets.
